Aces for Autism

Aces for Autism is a non-profit treatment and educational center dedicated to providing doctor prescribed, evidence-based therapies that significantly impact the lives of individuals with autism spectrum disorders (ASDs) and their families. We empower families and individuals impacted by autism to experience success from diagnosis through adulthood. Our goal is each individual and family we serve experience God's love and purpose for their life through the quality services we provide. Integrity, respect, advocacy, compassion, faith in God, and Christian values are the foundations of our organization.

Services:

- ABA Therapy: Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) has over 40 years of research supporting its effectiveness as a treatment for individuals with autism spectrum disorders. 1:1 therapy is provided by trained behavior staff, supervised by a Board-, Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA), and targets the INDIVIDUAL goals of each child. Goals can range from increased communication skills, independence, social skills, and much more. 1:1 therapy also targets the reduction of problem or inappropriate behavior such as self-injury or aggression.
- Facilitated Peer Play: Peer Play involves children on the spectrum who are having difficulties connecting with siblings or peers. A sibling or peer whom the child knows or plays with will partake in a one to two hour session with behavior staff.
- Parent Training Services: Family sessions are 1:1 instructional sessions with the child conducted by behavior staff while a primary caregiver observes, learns, and demonstrates the techniques.
- Parent and Professional Workshops are offered at no cost. Topics range from ABA strategies to help children, to insurance seminars, and more.
- Small Group Instruction: This instruction group targets early learning and social skills for both children on the spectrum and typically developing peers. Small Group Instruction is designed for young children who may be experiencing any of the following: difficulty in regular preschool settings, limited language skills, limited play interests or peer interactions, and have no significant problem behaviors. Groups are determined based on age and developmental levels. Group leaders are trained in ABA skills and ensure goals are being met. Children with autism may be pulled out to receive 1:1 Therapy when appropriate.
- School Consultative/ Training Services: Training for school district employees (teachers or aides) on ABA principles and other techniques found to be successful with children on the spectrum. We can also provide consultation when difficulties arise in the child's classroom. Program supervisors may also attend IEP meetings to support the family.

Building Hope Community Life Center

<u>Mission:</u> Touching Lives, Teaching Skills, and Transforming Communities by providing HOPE and a clear vision for the future generation.

<u>Vision:</u> We exist to see this generation forward filled with Hope by experiencing Gospel Centered Reconciliation, Family Restoration, & Community Transformation.



Programs:

- After School: Building Hope after school program focuses on building spiritual and moral development as well as the necessary educational skills for success. Building Hope serves over 115 students, from first through 12th grade, everyday.
- Men of Standard: 300 Men of Standard (MOS) is an intensive mentoring and job skills development program for young men 10 and up. The group meets after school and on the 1st and 3rd Friday for meals and messages focused on a clear vision of manhood—to reject passivity, to accept responsibility, to lead courageously, and to finish the course. The ultimate goal is to create a cohort of 300 young men, targeted because of academic and social risk factors, who commit to a code of conduct that includes academic, social, and physical standards.
- Women of Worth: Women of Worth (WOW) is a Middle School and High School mentoring program designed to empower young women to realize their value and to help them reach for their God given potential in life. WOW meets every 2nd and 4th Friday of the month. These meetings include inspirational messages, crafts, dance, and a time to teach the girls strategies to obtain a valued, quality lifestyle.
- Project Bridges: Students from schools we serve in our afterschool program who would normally receive a shortterm suspension are recommended to Project Bridges. For students who successfully complete the program, the suspension will not count on their record. The program offers classwork assistance, as well as character education, service learning, behavioral reflections and goal setting.
- Summer Camp: Our Summer Camp is designed to provide rising 6th graders through High School youth with the tools and resources to develop in their leadership gifting, skills, and creative abilities.

Carolina Pregnancy Center

<u>Vision:</u> To be the first resource women choose when facing an unplanned pregnancy.

<u>Mission</u>: To provide abortion alternatives, post abortion support, and sexual risk avoidance education with the hope of transforming lives through the grace of Jesus Christ.



All Services are Free and Confidential:

- Free Pregnancy Testing: If someone has missed a period or is experiencing other signs of pregnancy, it's important to get an accurate pregnancy test and talk to someone about any concerns. Carolina Pregnancy Center offers free on-site pregnancy tests.
- First Trimester Ultrasounds: After receiving verification of pregnancy, our medical staff may be able to offer to schedule an appointment for an ultrasound. These ultrasounds are to date and confirm the pregnancy, not to determine the medical diagnosis or gender of the baby.
- Parenting Classes: Day parenting classes are offered during office hours. Client attends 8 classes that include viewing an educational video and meeting with one of our client advocates. At the completion of classes, client is eligible to receive a car seat or other incentive based on availability. Night parenting classes are offered twice a year in the fall and spring. These classes are held at CPC for one night a week for 8 consecutive weeks. Clients are allowed to earn vouchers to turn in for material items for child.
- Maternity and Baby Clothes Services: Client can receive maternity clothes or baby clothes after watching an educational video and meeting with client advocate. Appointment required.
- Post Abortion Peer Counseling: We offer one-on-one counseling to help one heal from a current or past abortion.
- Community Referrals: Carolina Pregnancy Center partners with many outside community organizations to provide a wide range of services for women during pregnancy. We can also recommend and refer to additional organizations for further assistance. We do not refer to abortion providers.

Center for Family Violence Prevention



Mission: To break the cycle of domestic violence while enhancing individual self-sufficiency and promoting healthy family relationship in our community.

Did You Know...

- Domestic violence is a pattern of intentionally violent and/or controlling behavior used against a family member or a dating/intimate partner to gain power and control over that person, during and/or after the relationship.
- Domestic violence can affect everyone, regardless of age, gender, race, nationality, language, culture, economics, physical ability, sexual orientation or religion.
- Physical, verbal, emotional, sexual, and financial abuse are all forms of domestic violence.
- ❖ 1 in 3 women and a in 4 men report some form of physical abuse by an intimate partner at some time in their lives.
- ❖ 40-60% of children exposed to domestic violence are likely to become a victim or an abuser themselves.

How can you help a victim?

<u>Listen</u> in a non-judgmental way.

Ask if they are okay.

Support their decisions, no matter how hard it is.

Encourage them to seek options, through a counselor or a community resource.

Reinforce the **FACT** that the abuse is **NOT** their fault.

Remember that leaving the abuser is not an event. It is a process that takes time, patience and understanding.

Never confront the abuser.

Never give up on the victim.

The Center for Family Violence Prevention is a private, non-profit agency that is funded by state and federal government grants, United Way, churches, civic and community groups, individuals, other private donors, and our own re-sale stores. Through this funding, the Center provides critical services and resources to victims of domestic violence in Pitt, Martin, and Washington Counties.

Community Crossroads Center

<u>Mission</u>: At CCC our Mission is to "serve the poor and homeless in a continuum of care from basic shelter to prevention that empowers clients to achieve and maintain lives of self-sufficiency."

<u>Vision:</u> We want to be more than just a place for people to find shelter and food. It is our vision that we provide a central geographical resource center for people in the community to come to for basic needs. We are enlisting the help of churches, organizations and interested civic groups to be a part of this holistic endeavor.

Programs:

Shelter: The Emergency Shelter provides homeless adults and families temporary shelter and meals. On-site programs, Shelter staff, and community volunteers help clients access resources for independent living. The program emphasis is to help clients set short-term goals that will equip them for relocation into a stable environment upon exiting the Shelter. Maximum length of occupancy is six months.

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families: The TANF program, also known as the 200% Program, is a program offered by CCC which may provide assistance for families with children under the age of 18 years old. To qualify, you must have an income, must have children under the age of 18, and must live in Pitt County. Assistance that the program may offer includes housing services, first month's rent, or security deposit, or utilities deposit. No assistance is guaranteed, the program only helps with one of the above, and is only a one-time help. The mission is to assist families in acquiring and maintaining self-sufficiency and also to increase the family's ability to improve housing/financial stability. By providing 100% of these needs for a limited time, we hope to generate 200% more stability for families in the long-term. It is the intent of the program to prevent families from becoming homeless and to keep families in a stable environment. A referral is required in order to be considered for potential assistance and is seen by appointment only. Unfortunately, we cannot take walk-ins.

The Greenville Community Shelter Clinic: The GCSC is a free medical clinic run by medical students studying at the Brody School of Medicine at East Carolina University. The clinic offers basic medical services and referrals to anyone in need of them.

*The services below are temporarily paused due to work on our facility:

Respite Quarters: Community Crossroads Center is a "night only" shelter. However, often there are residents with disabilities, short-term medical conditions or other special situations that limit their ability to fend for themselves during the daytime hours when residents are expected to be out of the facility. Thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, the Respite Quarter was established in the old school building adjacent to the shelter. Residents that meet the requirements of the Respite Quarters' Policy are admitted. As with all programs here at Community Crossroads Center, we rely on our wonderful volunteers who offer companionship and support to those in need of a hand up. The Respite Quarters are open noon to 5 pm. Monday through Friday based on the availability of volunteers.

Clothing Closet: To donate clothing and coats and small household goods, please visit CCC Clothing Closet on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2-4pm. It is in the 2-story building beside the Shelter. We not only help provide clothing for our residents, but we help out anyone in the community.

Ways to be Involved:

Partnerships: We are looking to partner with any Faith based or Social Services organizations that will help our residents in reaching their goal of independent living.

Volunteer: We could not operate without the support and love of our volunteers. If you would like to make a difference in your community, you can volunteer with us. Our Volunteer Coordinator, Julie Morrow, will meet with you to go over the volunteer opportunities.

Daughters of Worth

<u>Mission & Vision:</u> Daughters of Worth was founded in 2015 and has a vision and mission to educate, equip, and empower girls of all ages to become strong women of influence in their communities. We work with girls of all ages within schools and the Boys and Girls club through our six signature programs to live out our mission.



Programs:

- GLAM Girls: GLAM, or Girls Living a Mission, is a group mentorship. This program is aligned with the NC Common Core Character Education and incorporates 21st Century Skills. Components include: knowing your self-worth, valuing your body, investing into positive friendship choices, having a vision for your life/goal setting, serving others, living with integrity, financial literacy, and character education.
- Notes of Hope: This program was developed in 2016 as an opportunity to inspire and encourage the girls of our communities through handwritten cards of encouragement, written by the women of our communities. As a girl is "adopted" into the Notes of Hope program through her local school, she receives a handwritten card of inspiration and encouragement, a Note of Hope, each month throughout the school year and is then invited to a special event at the end of the year.
- Grace Gifts: This program is designed to counteract poverty and empower girls towards financial freedom. Grace Gifts teaches financial literacy skills, instills strong work ethic, and equips girls in entrepreneurial skills.
- Empower Her! Events: The purpose of Empower Her! events are to create awareness, generate conversation and share community resources around hot topics that teens are confronted with. Topics include, but are not limited to, trafficking prevention, social media safety, and the red flags of dating violence. Our events are also geared towards building a bridge to close the gap between other community organizations and the teens of our communities.
- GLAM Girl Closet: The GLAM girl closet is designed to provide girls of all ages who are in need of clothing in our communities. Clothing is provided through the generous donations of others and as sizes are available. A recipient of our closet does not have to be a participant of our other signature programs. To request assistance, please contact Daughters of Worth to learn more.
- You Are So Loved bags: Upon recognizing the need for personal hygiene products and feminine hygiene items, Daughters of Worth offers You Are So Loved bags. These bags are filled with essential items that girls would need such as: toothpaste, toothbrush, soap, shampoo, and feminine hygiene products. You Are So Loved bags are placed in participating schools but are also available through the Daughters of Worth office for any school-age girl who is in need. <u>Vision:</u> FSN of ENC believes no family should have to walk an unexpected journey alone

Key Programs: FSN of ENC believes in the power of parents supporting parents. We provide a Listening ear, Hope for the future and Empowerment to families though our services which are all provided at no cost to families throughout 18 counties of Eastern North Carolina.

Support Parent Mentoring Program: Sometimes families with children who have special needs or who have experienced the loss of a child can get the best support from others who have experienced a similar journey. Through our Support Parent Mentoring Program, families seeking support from other parents can receive just that. We connect families to a trained volunteer mentor to talk with that has walked a similar path. Our access to state and nation-wide networks enables us to locate family matches for a variety of needs.

Family Connections Program: Our family connections events are designed to create a safe and supportive environment for families to connect with one another to ensure that no family has to walk alone. We provide the opportunity for all families who wish to participate the ability to join in family social events, parent groups, and sibling events. Workshops: Through collaboration with community partners, educational workshops are provided to families within their community to support the unique needs of families who have children with special needs. Workshops cover a variety of topics and aim to empower and equip families with up to date information, skills and leadership opportunities.

Parent Care Bags: Having a child in a treatment environment can be stressful on families. FSN of ENC provides family care bags to make the journey a little bit more comfortable. Care bags include notebooks and pens to keep track of valuable information; self-care items such as toothbrushes, chapstick, and combs, comfort items including socks, mints, snacks and crossword puzzles.

Aromatherapy Hearts: There are times when parents are not able to be physically present with their children during treatment or hospital stays. Aromatherapy hearts provide a way to stay connected through the sense of smell. FSN of ENC provides families with cloth hearts they can wear against their skin, absorbing the unique smell of the parents that can be placed with their children when they are not able to be present.

Service System Navigation: We provide assistance navigating complex service systems to increase access to needed supports and services for children and their families.



Ways to be Involved:

Share our Mission: Help us reach families who may be in need of support by sharing our mission in your local community. Let families know they do not need to walk their journey alone. We are here to walk beside them.

JOY Soup Kitchen

<u>Mission:</u> To establish, organize, operate and promote facilities and services in Pitt County for the benefit of the poor and other persons.

Our primary focus is to deal with food insecurity among the poor and homeless in our community. We are located in a part of the city that experiences food insecurity and lacks access to quality, wholesome food. Started as the Greenville Soup Kitchen in the mid 1980's, the JOY Soup Kitchen is the only place in Greenville that prepares and serves a free, daily meal to address an essential community need.



Services and Community Engagement:

Meals:

- JOY serves a free, nutritious meal each weekday from 10:30 – 11:45, serving around 25,000 meals annually.
- Evening Meals are served every Tuesday &
 Thursday from 5:30 7:00 (except the second
 Tuesday of the month when Disabled American

Health Services:

- Pitt County AIDS Service Organization (PICASO) provides HIV screening and counseling on the first Wednesday of each month.
- Diabetes and blood pressure screening provided during the mid-day meal each month.
- On occasional Saturdays, the ECU Dental School serves a meal and provides dental screening.
- Building Space Availability: The JOY Community
 Building provides space to the Disabled American
 Veterans Chapter #37, which provides benefits
 counseling from 8:00 2:00 on Tuesdays &
 Thursdays and alternate Saturdays from 8:00 noon.

L.A.M.B.'s Place is still in the process of being established and is seeking to offer the following services for young adults:


- Affordable/ transitional housing for youth 18-25 years old. Our heart is to have a home for males, females, and young mothers/expecting mothers

Lifetime of Joy

<u>Mission:</u> Caring for young parents in our community by providing essential goods and a network of helpers.

<u>Vision:</u> The Lifetime of Joy Baby Pantry will demonstrate the heart of Christ for babies and their parents, occasioning a happier parenting experience by: (1) providing essential goods for baby care, (2) fostering healthy relationships with other parents, and (3) bringing together community services.





Hollywood Church has put their love and faith into action through the following services:

- Pantry Assistance: Lifetime of Joy helps to ease the financial strain on young families by providing diapers, wipes, and other baby care products to families in need. Families on WIC, SNAP, or Medicaid automatically qualify to receive a monthly pack of diapers, wipes, and 3 other items of need from the pantry. Families who do not receive government assistance will be asked to provide information for a non-family reference for proof of need. Families receiving assistance will need to attend the motherhood support gathering at the church each month or an approved parent education or childhood development event each month.
- Motherhood Support: The Mothers of Many Seasons (M.O.M.S.) is a biblically based mothers group of all ages that hosts and leads the motherhood support gathering every 3rd Saturday of the month. Older moms act as mentors to new and young moms with young children. Each month a "mentor mom" leads in a devotion and discussion on an important motherhood topic. Along with M.O.M.S. devotion, a different guest speaker is invited each month refreshments and childcare provided. Playdates and outings are scheduled monthly for fellowship for moms and their families. While this outreach program works to support the baby pantry, these gatherings are not limited to families receiving assistance through the baby pantry.

Lifetime of Joy exists as part of Hollywood Church EPC. Hollywood Church has a passion for joy and wishes it for everyone, but also realizes how difficult a struggle it can be to maintain joy with the stresses of parenting, working, and providing for young children in a growing family. Mothers of Many Seasons motherhood support group also exists as part of Hollywood EPC and works together with Lifetime of Joy to support the baby pantry. The Lifetime of Joy Baby Pantry was so-named because we are pro-life, meaning, we care about unborn babies. But more than that; we are pro-lifetime - we care about babies (and their parents) AFTER children are born! And we wanted the name of the baby pantry to show that we care about life, joy, babies and parents.


Riley's Army

<u>Mission:</u> The mission of Riley's Army is to provide support to children with cancer and their families in Eastern North Carolina. This mission is accomplished by:

- Organizing volunteers to provide individualized support for the family to maintain a healthy home environment.
- Providing educational, financial and logistical support for the children and family as they navigate along the difficult path of childhood cancer treatment.
- Facilitate efforts of existing service organizations, churches and individuals for pediatric cancer patients and their families.
- Raise awareness of pediatric cancer and advocate for patient centered care.

History:

At age 5, Riley Philpot was diagnosed with Wilm's Tumor in May 2006. Initial treatment required surgery to remove her right kidney and 6 months of outpatient chemotherapy. A routine follow-up confirmed relapse of her cancer with metastasis to her lungs in June 2007. Riley was treated for her cancer with chemotherapy, radiation, surgeries, and stem cell transplants. In August 2010, Riley faced the fourth relapse of her cancer. Despite both of her parents being physicians, Riley's diagnosis of cancer threw them into a world of treatment that was difficult to navigate. Dr. Kirk and Kelly Philpot's medical experience is a blessing that helped them on their journey and allowed them to see potential ways to help other families in similar circumstances. Throughout Riley's battle with cancer, there was an outpouring of support from friends, family, and their Church. This support became known as "Riley's Army." Riley's spirit brought people together to care for those in need in our community. Riley passed away in 2011, but her legacy lives on. Riley's Army continues to grow to create a lasting force to care for other children and families on similar journeys.
